Copper, iron, and aluminum: Where do they come from?

Presented by Howard Heitner PhD

7:20 p.m. Virtual portal open.

7:30 p.m. Lecture.

About the Presentation: Copper, iron, and aluminum: Where do they come from? The presentation will address three metals which are critical to our industrial economy. Iron and copper utilization go back to ancient times when they were used for tools and weapons. On the other hand, aluminum has a history of less than 200 years. These useful elements are extracted from ores, which the talk will focus on. The entire sequence, from ore mining to final product, is governed by economics. In addition, the ore processing and metal production have important environmental consequences.

About the Presenter:

Dr. Howard Heitner has been collecting minerals for over 60 years. Among his many interests in all things mineral, is the history of collecting and dealing, fluorescence, and pseudomorphs. On these topics he has shared his expertise with the Academy over the years. His career was spent as a chemist in the Greater New York region, primarily developing chemicals used in mineral processing. Howard moved near Rochester some years ago, and joined the Mineral Section of our Academy. He keeps busy attending RMSC exhibit workshops, posting specimens on Mindat, as well as organizing his extensive collection.

Past Trips, Meetings and Events

Over the summer and into September we visited our usual spots and a new quarry in Albion, NY. The Eagle Harbor Quarry in Albion, NY was a freshly blasted quarry. While not many specimens other than dog tooth calcite were found it offered a glimpse of something different. This quarry is a sand and gravel quarry. In the quarry you could see the sand layer that sits on top of the bedrock. This sand had lots of treasures inside, gneiss, polished fossil "soup", and other glacial debris was found. A member even found a greenish log which he believed was buried during the ice age. So while not petrified still a cool find. Another notable find was dog tooth calcite covered in natural petroleum. As an added bonus the owner was on sight and gave us a great run down of the geologic layers and history of this newer quarry.

History of the BGS

The society was originally formed on February 2nd, 1938 as the Geological Section of the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences. Dr. Irving G. Reimann, Curator of Geology at the Buffalo Museum of Science was the first president. Its purpose is to bring people together that enjoy learning, studying, collecting, and sharing in a family atmosphere this common interest of geological sciences and related fields. These fields range from mineralogy and paleontology to lapidary and beyond. This is accomplished by annual shows, meetings, swaps, banquets, field trips, continuing education groups, and many more monthly programs that end or begin with a social hour. Regular meetings occur October through April on the first Friday of every month. Meetings start at 7:30pm and are free/open to the public. Membership starts at \$15.00 for individuals and \$20.00 for families. We meet at 100 Lee street in Buffalo, NY 14210 in the Heritage Discovery Center.
